## AFTER 5 YEARS, MILL'S FACELIFT IS NEARLY COMPLETED



Early last summer, after replacing siding, trim boards and repairing windows, Countryside Builders from Cyrus arrived to paint the front of the mill. With their handy cherry picker, they painted the top two floors. The first floor was painted by Board Members and volunteers while they drank a lot of coffee and solved the world's problems. This was the crowning piece nearing the end of the long period of restoration. Some work was done each year as funds allowed.

The first important job was to reinforce the foundation of the back corner. While working on the back, siding and trim boards were replaced and windows were repaired. After the basement door was rebuilt, the entire back of the mill was painted.

Next was the work on the south side with trim boards and siding replaced and windows repaired. It should be noted that all construction and materials met the Secretary of the Interior's standards for the treatment of historic properties.

Most noticeable is the rebuilt stage in front of the mill with the added deck for the sound engineer. The grounds were beautifully landscaped in the back making a park-like setting.

The board members spent over a week in the basement cleaning out a hundred years worth of debris. There was enough to fill a large dumpster. During this time, deterioration and twisting was observed on the North side of the foundation. It will be necessary to brace the building, provide exterior drainage and re-paint the foundation.

The North side steps will be replaced. Restoration and painting will have to be done to this side at a later date.

# DESCENDANTS OF JONAS DANELZ VISIT

The mill was opened on June 29 for a special visit by three generations of the Danelz family. The group included great grandchildren to great, great, great grandchildren who came from Illinois and Georgia.

Jonas Danelz, who lived in Swift Falls, built the third mill and the stone arch bridge in 1903.

"Jonas came from Sweden with his mother," said great grandson, Ron. "They first lived in New York before they moved to Swift Falls. Their original name was Danielszon."

The group was impressed with the condition of the mill and what has been recorded.

There was much amusement and debate about whether a picture was of Jonas Danelz or George Wheeler as there was a strong resemblance.

A story passed through the years tells about Jonas always keeping a bottle of whiskey hidden by his register in his Swift Falls mill. "He would give his customer a little shot to go along with their business."

This approach uses flowers as a focus more than scrolls. The designs are symmetrical, but not necessarily a mirror image. The colors are bright, strong and opaque with a minimum of shading.



The project for this class was a candle holder or, as the class decided to call this beautiful finished project: a "lys holden."

The climax of the class was an evaluation of the large number of pieces that were entered in this year's competition. ## **GRANT REQUESTS: 2009 – 2010**

### **RESTORATION AND MAINTENANCE**

#### **Phase III Restoration and Maintenance 2009**

The Minnesota Historical Society matching grant application for replacing siding and painting the second and third floors of the front of the mill was not funded. Funds for these projects were derived through donations from TMF members, Board of Directors and sponsors from Kentucky, Tennessee and Florida.

The upper floors were completed in early summer by Countryside Builders, Cyrus, MN. The ground level beneath the overhang was completed by TMF volunteers just prior to the September Fiddlers' Contest. The total cost of this project was \$3,600.00.

#### **Stabilization of the North Wall of the Foundation, 2010**

A Minnesota Historical and Cultural Grant Application for Historic Preservation has been submitted requesting \$25,088.00. If funded, work will begin in August, 2010 and be completed October 1, 2010.

### **ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT**

LRAC (Lake Region Arts Council) support grant for 2010 has been submitted for \$2,120. These funds are to pay the wages of the Site Manager/Docent.

### **PERFORMING ARTS**

#### **Children's Theatre, 2010**

The LRAC funded our grant request for \$1,040.00. This will be used for the Children's Theatre workshops and productions. Additional funds for this worthwhile project were made available through Tastefully Simple (\$250.00).

#### **Clown Academy**

Funding for the new TMF Clown Academy is being sponsored by an anonymous donor in memory of John Eskelson.

#### **Heritage Festival, 2011**

An LRAC Legacy Grant for the support of 2011 Heritage Festival will be submitted in September, 2010.

# MINUTES AWAY 10,000 YEARS AGO

About six or seven miles south east of Terrace on Highway 104, one could look from a hill top and see how the land looked in pre settlement days. This land was formed from when the glaciers deposited 10,000 years ago. This hilltop (pull off on north east part of preserve) overlooks The Nature Conservancy tract known as Ordway Prairie. Something new awaits your senses no matter when you visit Ordway Prairie!

This amazing 581 acre prairie remnant is what remains of what was once the landscape in Western Minnesota. There is less than 1/2 of one percent of native prairie remaining in Minnesota. This prairie remnant is awash in color from early May until November. The beauty of this prairie is that it changes color weekly with new prairie flowers and grasses blooming almost daily. The Pasque Flower is the earliest to bloom. The name comes from French, *passe-fleur*, the change in spelling of the first word was due to an association with archaic *pasque* 'Easter' (because of the plant's flowering around Easter). Later in the Spring the tiny flowers of the Blue-Eyed-Grass tints a light blue color over the steep slopes in the southern and eastern parts of the prairie remnant. As the season progresses, there are dozens of other colorful flowers that will intrigue the senses. If you are lucky, you might find a White Lady's Slipper close to one of the sloughs. This species is listed as one of special concern in Minnesota. During the autumn, one will see many Asters and Goldenrods. The sea of grasses late in the year will really show their colors, namely the Big Blue Stem and the Little Blue Stem.

There are rare butterflies and other insects of interest. If you enjoy bird watching, you will see rare sparrows and an occasional Upland Sandpiper, (you will hear the melodic "pulip pulip" likely before you see the bird). One of my favorite prairie birds is the Bobolink; it looks like it put its suit on backwards! Hawks, Eagles, Osprey, Pelicans and Turkey Vultures will be the large birds flying above. More and more wild Turkeys are seen in this area, and early morning brings out their "gobble gobble." The evening will get the owls moving and a Great Horned Owl is not uncommon to see at dusk.

Take a short trip down the road from Terrace and be amazed at what awaits you any time of year!
